We had over 400 visitors who viewed nearly 150 paintings and folios.22 paintings were sold and cards were as popular as ever. The tombola is always popular and raised nearly £200.00 (a record)

Financially the exhibition did well, hanging fees were £252, paintings and folios and cards sold amounted to £1725 making £172.50 commission, and the tombola took in £194 better than ever. Hall costs for the weekend were £410, giving an overall profit for the society of £208.

The most important thing about the exhibition however was the wonderful friendly atmosphere, helped by the stewards and others who welcomed visitors into the hall. This makes the event more than just a sale, it makes it memorable and fun for visitors, helpers and artists.
